Engaging RC Yala in Godawari-Phulchowki Forests Conservation Area

"...living in harmony with nature"

Background: A forest ecosystem offers numerous ecological services to the communities living in the area, its surroundings and often far beyond, and is critical to human welfare and survival. Besides, forest resources significantly contribute to nation's economy directly and indirectly, provided that they are properly managed.

Highlands around Kathmandu valley embrace lusty forest covers, providing the valley with fertile land, fresh water, captivating natural beauty and favorable climate. This perfect condition for habitation has attracted people to settle in this valley since historical times. In due course, it has gradually become the center for major economic activities, social and cultural development, and political power. However, in the recent past, the valley has seen unprecedented rapid urbanization and, as a consequence, exerted a huge pressure on its environment. This, regrettably, unregulated growth is pushing the urban sprawl further into the foothills, raising concerns over potential damage to the existing forests surrounding the valley and their biodiversity.

Among four prominent hills that surround the Kathmandu valley Phulchowki, located in the South-East corner, is the highest hill with an altitude of 2,765 m above msl. It covers forest area of 2,128.88 ha (2,078.35 ha in Lalitpur and 50.53 ha in Kavrepalanchowk districts). Phulchowki watershed with its rich biodiversity is an important lifeline for the inhabitants of the Kathmandu valley and directly supports those living in Lalitpur and some parts of Kavrepalanchowk district. This ecosystem is habitat for countless species of plants, animals and microbial life, provides fresh water, wood, biomass and herbs, balances local and micro climate by moderating temperature and promoting rain, serves as a body for carbon sink, and offers spiritual/cultural, recreational, research and educational opportunities. All these services have contributed towards improving

well-being of the people living in the area and its proximity.

Phulchowki watershed remains a biologically productive ecosystem. However, with the increased human actions, impacts of global climate change and other external stressors, one is not sure how far it will continue to be resilient to such shocks. Given the importance of this ecosystem and to mitigate potential shocks it may have to face due to those stressors, the Government of Nepal has recently declared national forests in the Phulchowki hill as **Godawari-Phulchowki Forests Conservation Area** (Ref: Govt. of Nepal Gazette no. 72-16-5 issued on 22 June 2022), which must be considered as timely and essential for well-being of the population depending on it.









Rationale: While inclusion of Phulchowki watershed as one of the forest conservation areas in Nepal is an important step of the government to protect and regulate the natural resources, successful implementation of such plan will not be fully realized unless there is a strong and meaningful participation of all stakeholders, including local communities living in the area. It is in this context that some members of the Rotary Club of Yala with a long and varied experience in different professions have taken an initiative, purely as a philanthropic mission, to set up a platform to complement the efforts of the government, the community living in the area and other stakeholders by offering its supports and services.

Overall Goal: The overall goal of the proposed platform, Phulchowki Area Conservation Trust (PACT), under the auspices of the RC Yala, is to contribute in improving and strengthening the knowledge-base and collaborate with stakeholders to implement activities that would help to protect and conserve the Phulchowki watershed and its bio-diversity, and enhancing the productivity of its ecosystem services as well as welfare of the population living in the area. This platform aims to serve as a credible entity and play a catalytic role towards conservation and development of the Phulchowki hill.

RC Yala endeavors to implement its activities in collaboration with the Ministry of Forests and Environment and concern departments (Federal Government), including Division Forest Offices/Sub-Division Forest Offices (Provincial Government), as well as with municipality and ward offices (Local Government), and community forestry user groups. Partnerships will be sought with entities like NTNC (National Trust for Nature Conservation), ICIMOD (International Centre for Integrated Mountain Development), NAST (Nepal Academy of Science and Technology), academia and civil societies who have a stake on the conservation and development of the Phulchowki area and have considerable knowledge and resources to contribute towards those overarching goals.

Scopes of Work: Following are the primary areas PACT has identified for rendering its services.

1. Research and Information Management – Our focus in this area will be on elements of Phulchowki ecosystem services and their optimum uses, impacts of human activities and climate change, and environmentally-friendly appropriate technologies, services and green agenda. Academia shall be engaged to undertake researches through post-graduate students as well as other dedicated research activities. A repository of information/ data related to Phulchowki hill conservation and development will be maintained and shared for public consumption on open-source platforms.

and Public Awareness Educational 2 Outreach - We will disseminate and instill facts and useful knowledge to the local communities, who are dependent on Phulchowki watershed, about the importance of forest ecosystem services, conservation goals and sustainable development of the area. This will be achieved through conducting Phulchowki talk series/seminars/workshops, organization of field visits and in-situ demonstrations, engaging with educational institutions in the area, and participating in relevant programs/events, social media and publications.

3. Protection and Conservation of Forest Ecosystem – While responsibilities under this domain primarily fall under the scope of forestry offices and the community forest user groups, we will make available services of Rotary members to share their professional expertise and knowledge for execution of annual programs and activities endorsed by the Ministry of Forests and Environment both at Federal and Provincial levels and their Departments

4. Community Empowerment and Livelihoods – Community empowerment and provision of livelihood opportunities to the local communities are indispensable to attain sustainable development and conservation goals. As such initiatives will be taken to imparting skills and knowledge in health, hygiene and waste management, natural resources management and uses, disaster preparedness and response, agro-forestry based cottage industries for income generation, and providing opportunities for employments through village tourism/home stay as well as eco-tourism, such as nature walk, hiking, adventure sports, star gazing and educational excursion in Phulchowki area.

Cultural and Recreational Services -5. Phulchowki, like other three hills (Shivapuri, Nagarjun and Chandragiri) around Kathmandu valley, is revered as a sacred place by both Hindus and Buddhists. Several important religious and cultural activities are held in the area every year, and the communities from nearby old settlements like Badegaon, Thaiba, Harishiddi, Luvu, Thashi, and Lele observe particular festivals dedicated to Phulchowki goddess, located on the top of the hill. Besides, there are many places of worship/monuments located in different parts of the Phulchowki hill, which are visited by thousands of devotees every year. The area is also a popular destination for picnickers and people seeking recreations. Given this, we will seek to coordinate and collaborate with local authorities and communities to facilitate such activities in an organized and regulated manner with the principle of "do no harm" to the nature and local socio-cultural practices.

Organization and Ways Forward: Given the nature of the tasks, RC Yala has committed itself to engage in this initiative as a flagship project for a minimum of five years. Accordingly, initial preparations are being made by forming two teams: one focusing on internal arrangements/procedures, including fund raising, resource management and communication with other Rotary Clubs at district 3292 and beyond, and another one to reaching out to external entities for collaborations and partnerships. Consultations with key external entities have started in last couple of months at different levels and so far the responses have been encouraging for RC Yala's engagement in this noble cause with the motto of 'living in harmony with nature', which cuts across several focus areas of the Rotary movement and perfectly fits with its mission, i.e., take actions to create a lasting change – across the globe, in our communities, and in ourselves.

As we move along the consultation process in the course of coming months, we shall identify key issues/activities that come under five broad scopes outlined above, and will be further harmonized and prioritized in line with the plans of the stakeholders implementing projects in Godawari-Phulchowki forests conservation area and the communities surrounding it. The activities thus set out will then be transformed into work plans with clear indicators for implementation, resource mobilization and measurement of outcomes.

Yala WASH programs

Rotary Club of Yala has steered WASH programs in public schools and local communities since its inception in 1996. Nepal has been facing a major challenge in fulfilling every child's right to water, sanitation and hygiene education. Though Nepal is blessed with huge amount of fresh water, the government has been unable to safeguard the wellbeing of children due to the difficult terrain and poor access to sparsely distributed settlements. There are hundreds of thousands of children who lack proper access to drinking water, sanitation facilities and hygiene education.

A number of international partners (RI District 2700 Fukuoka, Rotary Club of Wrexham-UK, Rotary Club of Jindalee-Brisbane, RI District 9630 Brisbane-Australia) have supported RC Yala's several WASH programs in schools and communities. These programs encompassed wells construction, rain water harvesting and ground recharge, drinking water purification, toilets construction, sanitary and menstrual hygiene, and WASH education.

Phulchowki School

Phulchowki Higher Secondary School, a public-community school, is located at Thaiba of Godawari Municipality in Lalitpur District. It has four buildings within its premise of 22 Ropani land. The main building with 30 rooms is awaiting renovation, since Great Earthquake of 2015. The classes are run in the remaining limited spaces for Early Child Development to Bachelor's level with a total population of 65 teachers and 1300 students including 780 females. This has severely impacted the limited WASH facilities. During class-breaks the students, especially girls, have to wait in long queues to relieve themselves forcing them to miss lessons after the breaks.

Based on the request by the School Management and field assessment of the current WASH situation, RC Yala decided to build new toilets with 20-25 urinals and 6-7 cubicles for defecation. The installation of these will help school management to maintain academic and administrative discipline as well as clean and hygienic environment.

Moreover, this project will improve health, foster learning and enable children to participate as agents of change for their siblings and parents and the community at large. This project will contribute to Rotary's effort in making sure that every child receives the benefits of WASH in Schools.

Objective of Yala WASH Programs

The objective of the Yala WASH programs is to realize five key benefits of WASH in Schools

- Healthy & protective school environment minimizing risk of disease, abuse & exclusion;
- 2. Brings pride and commitment among children by enabling them to become agents of change;
- 3. Investment in the health and well-being of future generations;
- 4. Promotes gender equity leading to higher girls' school attendance & retention;
- 5. Discourages habit of defecation in open

Cooperation and Resources

It's quite encouraging to mention that the Godawari Municipality, Sister Club RC Jindalee and Yala Rotarians instantaneously committed to raise funds for needed resources to implement this WASH program in the Phulchowki School.

The program targets to construct separate toilets for boys and girls, install water tanks &

plumbing-flooring, and improve sanitation and menstrual hygiene (installing sanitary dispenser and incinerator system and sanitary pads). Out of these facilities, only toilets are being constructed at present due to limited resources and the remaining facilities will be added later when funds are available. The initial budget of NRS 60 Lakhs (~USD 46,000) has been halved to NPR 30 Lakhs (~USD 23,000) that includes NPR 7 Lakhs from Godawari Municipality, NPR 8 Lakhs from RC Jindalee and RID 9630 Brisbane District Grant, and NPR 15 Lakhs from RC Yala's project fund.

Livelihoods and Distribution of Majhi Social Group in Khotang and Okhaldhunga Districts of Koshi Province

Majhi: Living with the Saptakoshi River

Nepal is considered to be the treasure-trove of globally significant biological and cultural diversity. The Indigenous Peoples (Adibasi Janajati/Indigenous Nationalities) of Nepal, almost all live close to nature and depend on natural resources for their survival. Their cultural and socio-political values are instrumental to the protection and sustainable management of natural resources. The recent development practices, population pressure and growing urbanization have posed threats to both the culture and nature of indigenous peoples. As a result, the Indigenous peoples have been displaced from their traditional territories. They, no longer, enjoy customary rights over their natural resources. The discrimination and marginalization of indigenous peoples have resulted in their impoverishment. Consequently, many indigenous peoples have already lost their cultures and natural environments .

Nepal is the home of 59 indigenous nationalities. These nationalities are distributed in different regions of Nepal; 18 in the Mountain (Himalaya) region, 24 in the Hilly region, 6 in the Inner Taraai region and 11 in the Taraai region. Among them, the Majhi social groups are largely distributed in the inner Taraai region of Nepal.

Majhi social groups are one of the indigenous peoples (Adibasi Janajati) of Nepal. Their ancestral territories had embedded relationships with the Saptakoshi River (Indrawati, SunKoshi, TamaKoshi, Likhu, Dudhkoshi, Arun, and Tamor) that flow through hilly and inner Taraai regions of Nepal . Tributaries of Saptakoshi include Indrawati of Sindhupalchok; Tamakoshi of Ramechhap and Dolakha; Likhu (Varun) of Ramechhap and Okhaldunga; Dudhkoshi of Okhaldhunga, Khotang, and Sankhuwasabha; Arun of Bhojpur, Samkhuwasabha and Dhankuta; Tamor of Dhankuta, Panchthar and Tehrathum. Majhi migrated to Makwanpur from Sindhupalchok and Kavre; to Sindhuli from Kavre, Ramechhap, and Okhaldhunga; to Udaypur from Ramechhap, Okhaldhunga, and Khotang; and to Arun and Tamor from Dudhkoshi, Tamakoshi, and Sunkoshi. Majhi in other places migrated from these seven rivers. According to the 2011 Census, the total population of the Majhi is 83,727 and the majority of them live in the hill and the lowland (the Taraai) of the central and the eastern regions of Nepal.

During the Shah-Rana regime in Nepal, Majhi were recognized for their traditional services i.e. ferrying. They were granted Kipat land (communal ownership of land) in their ancestral territories, which helped them to continue their customary ways of life. The Kipat was granted for their services to ferrying people and to take government officials and postmen across different Ghaat/s (river banks) even during the rainy season. After the political changes in 1950s, the state denied their traditional rights of fishing and boating which fundamentally altered their socio-economic conditions and dispossessed them from their lands and embedded relationship with the local rivers. The arrivals of socially dominant groups in Majhi villages-the hill "high" caste Hindus in particular, led to the increased landlessness among Majhi to such an extent that many Majhi migrated to other places in search of daily livelihoods. The cultural assimilative policies imposed by the Panchayat (1960 to 1990) regime were further instrumental in marginalizing Majhi. Majhi became landless .

In the past, these areas were inflicted with virulent malaria and only Majhi social group could live and survive there. Majhi were the first cultivators of the plain lands in these river basins. Majhi social groups have their own distinct culture and customary ways of life and speak, Majhi kura , a spoken language belonging to the Indo-Aryan family. They are 'nature worshippers' and also known as 'tantric' religion. However, many Majhi practice syncretic religious practices both 'tantric' and Hindu religions in the changing context.

Majhi have closely connected with the Koshi River culturally and religiously. Nowadays, they perform Koshi puja every year on Tuesday of third week of Falgun. They also do ancestral rites in the Koshi River. Majhi living along these rivers also consider themselves as Bote. Moreover, the former chairman of the Nepal Majhi Upliftment Association Dhan Bahadur Majhi says: 'Majhi are animist. They worship jungle, rivers, hills, mountains, and air through tantric means, and they believe that tantric power preserves humans, animals, and agricultural land.' Due to influence of Hinduism, some Majhi perform Hindu rituals. Now some are also attracted to Christianity, especially the poor Majhi .



Ferrying and Economy

In the rural sphere of Nepalese community, Majhi social groups are synonymously known as 'Majhi, Machha (fish) and Paani (water).' To elaborate it, Majhi social groups' customary life directly depends on the rivers. Subsistence farming, fishing, boat making and helping people to cross the rivers in ferries have been their primary occupation. In the past, people and villagers used to pay a fee called khewa to Majhi for their services of crossing local people across the river in their boats. Villagers residing around the rivers would give them grains yearly in the form of dhungepathi. Hence, this form of reciprocal relationship ensured a stable source of income and means of livelihoods to the Majhi social groups. But, the construction of bridges (both concrete and suspension), Majhi lost their traditional occupation of ferrying.

Majhi use net and hooks to fish, but people from other social groups began to collect fish using electric current and chemicals, so there is decreasing the quantity of fish in the rivers. In this way, Majhi have been gradually detaching from fishing. Moreover, construction of small, medium and big dams on the river to generate electricity from hydropower further obstruct the movement of fish and their growth rate. Thus, they have been compelled to do cultivation and cattle raising in whatever small landholdings they possess.



Agriculture production is not enough to feed their children and other family members throughout the year; only sufficient for three to six months. Food security is one of the prominent problem of Majhi. Hence, they choose foreign employment as a migrant worker to the Gulf countries as the alternative livelihoods options and skilled and unskilled construction workers in urban areas in Kathmandu before leaving to third countries as the migrant workers. While working in Kathmandu, Majhi youth

make passport as a part of preparing to go to the foreign countries and explore appropriate manpower companies and/or consultancies.

The majority of Majhi are live in below the poverty line. Especially Majhi women specialize in making high-quality Marcha (yeast cakes for making beer). Majhi people, who have been engaged to help people safely cross rivers from many generations, are now become one of the marginalized social groups and excluded indigenous nationalities in Nepal. Majhi, as the other indigenous and marginalized social groups in Nepal, are, at present, struggling to continue and to preserve their culture and identity and reclaiming their sovereign indigenous rights.

Distribution of Majhi in Khotang and Okhaldhunga Districts

The Majhi social groups are distributed in the confluence of Dudhkoshi and Sunkoshi at the boundary between Khotang and Okhadhunga districts in the eastern part of Nepal. Both districts lie under the Koshi Province. This study found that Majhi social groups are living in two Palikas of Khotang district namely Rawa Beshi Rural Municipality (three settlement of Majhi) and Halesi Tuwachung Municipality (two settlement of Majhi). In Okhaldhunga districts, they are distributed in two Palikas Chisankhugadhi Rural Municipality (two settlement of Majhi) and Siddhicharan Municipality (one settlement of Majhi).

Majhi settlements in Khotang District

Majhi social groups are distributed in five settlements in Khotang district; three settlements namely Majhi Gaun, Bhaludhunga and Hattisar in Rawa Beshi Rural Municipality, ward no-3, Lamidanda and two settlements viz. Ghopataar and Majhi Basti in Halesi Tuwachung Municipality, ward no-4 Badahare and ward no-1, Jayaramghaat respectively. The field study found that total 128 Majhi households spread over five settlements. Majhi Gaun accounts higher number of households i.e. 64 whereas Majhi Basti (Jayaramghaat) has only 8 households. All settlements are nearby and/or along with the Dudhkoshi River and altitude ranges 427m to 640m (Table 1).

According to vice-chairperson of the Nepal Majhi Upliftment Association, district chapter, Khotang, around 10-12 Majhi households in Majhi Gau are going to be denuded due to the 635 MW Dudhkoshi storage hydroelectric project and he stressed that they still need external supports to make Majhi people's livelihoods more comfortable.

Majhi settlements in Okhaldhunga District

Majhi social groups are spread over three settlements in Okhaldhunga district; two settlements namely Bhoje and Majhitaar in Chisankhugadhi Rural Municipality, ward no-6, Bhadaure and ward-1, Kuibhir respectively. Similarly, Mulghaat, ward no-1 Taluwa in Siddhicharan Municipality. The field study revealed that total 66 Majhi households distributed in three settlements. Majhitaar has higher number of households i.e. 43 whereas Mulghaat accounts 6 households. All settlements are nearby and/or along with the Dudhkoshi River and altitude ranges 431m to 682m (Table 2).

Conclusions

Availability of water: a better livelihoods option


Water scarcity is a prominent problem of Majhi settlements even though they are living along the Dudhkoshi river. Availability of enough water in the Majhi settlements is the primary crux for the better livelihoods options to the Majhi social groups. Thus, the study team recommends lifting water from Dudhkoshi should be put into first priority before intervening any livelihoods development activities and that would be a 'value for money.'

Once addressing problem of water scarcity, there are many avenues to enhancing livelihoods options for Majhi social groups such as fishing in eco-friendly water conservation ponds; vegetable (both seasonal and off-seasonal) farming; and black pig and local chicken farming.

Collection and Knowledge Center (CKC): A marketing strategy

Most of the Majhi settlements are connected with all-weather roads thus accessibility of market will not be a big problems. However, the study team recommends the collective marketing mechanism should be established through the Collection and Knowledge Center (CKC) that enhance the bargaining power of any products of Majhi social groups. This will provide rationale cost to the primary producers and save their time to deal with the market and/ or going to the market to sell the product in small quantity.







Nights, we slept in so called tea house somewhere in NOSHYAMPATI (3700m) as the wind whistled outside. The room was furnished with wooden bunk platforms for some 20 people. We are lucky that night that we found an unoccupied bunk. Food was so horrible even our hungry stomach say no to this. The toilets were literally over flowing with dirt. People prefer often open ground, wherever the urge struck. Only one tea house was opened during November and we didn't had any choices in that coldest temperature. Can't sleep whole night due to weather and lack of additional blankets. At 5:00 AM, we left our bed for sunrise, though lots of trekkers meditated inside there blankets. Every time is tea time in Nepal. Started our first day trek from village called DEURALI (an hour drive from BHOTANG) after having black tea. BHOTANG is the social and commercial hub before PANCH POKHARI. We all trekked at our own pace, pausing often for refreshment at trailside teahouses and to chat with passersby. Most of the time I have been trekking with a group of complete strangers. No less but sometimes I had also been undertaken with one or two trusted friends, or alone. In trekking have confidence in your teammates is no small concern. One trekker's actions can affect the welfare of the entire team.

Delicious foods was waiting for us at TUPI DANDA. Here we had rice, lentil, and

mushroom potatoes mix vegetables and pickle. Clicked pictures, selfie and uploaded to social media platforms. After our lunch we resumed the trek toward NOSHYAMPATI. The trail took us past glades of Junifer and dwarf birch, pine trees, thundering waterfalls and lakes.

"Only 10 minutes more" was readymade reply whenever and wherever you asked "How far is the next destination?" After so many 10 minutes we reached NOSHYAMPATI. This was the place where we rested that day.

Next day we continued our trek towards PANCH POKHARI (4100m) from NOSHYAMPATI. From NOSHYAMPATI, paths were filled with rocks, and many stairs before LAURI BINA (without a stick). There are myths that one should leave their stick in LAURI BINA. But nobody cared to do so. The last rocky dangerous stairs lead us towards the beautiful PANCH





POKHARI (5 holy Ponds). PANCH POKHARI is not only naturally beautiful but also the ninth highest altitude wetland in the World. PANCH POKHARI is named as because there are a total of 5 divine ponds in the SINDHUPALCHOWK district of Nepal. PANCH POKHARI is popular destination during Janai Purnima (one of the festivals of Nepal) in the month of August among Hindu and Buddhist pilgrims.

Exploring few hours in this comparatively less explored region of trekking despite the spectacular scenic wonders. There is also a saying that, taking a bath in these scared ponds, it will wash away bad karma and remove impurities from our past. Whether it was real or myth, but few of us undress and jumped into the pond and worship the god of the god "Mahadev". Jay Sambho. After having lunch we headed back to NOSHYAMPATI. Evenings were peaceful. Less people than yesterday. Not to mention dinner here but we slept good 8 hours. Few of our teammates was outside the tea house. Counting stars.



Bylaws of Rotary Club of Yala

First Amended on May 5, 2017 Second Amended on February 19, 2021 Third Amended on April , 2023 (As adopted by club meeting #1362)

Article 1 Definitions

1. Board: The Board of Directors of this club.

2. Director: A member of this club's Board of Directors.

3. Member: A member, other than an honorary member, of this club.

4. Quorum: One-third of the club membership; a majority of directors for the Board.

5. RI: Rotary International.

6. Year: The 12-month period that begins on 1 July.

Article 2 Board

The governing body of this club is the Board consisting of the president, immediate past president, president-elect, president nominee, vice president, secretary, treasurer, 5 directors, sergeant-at-arms, club trainer and editor.

Article 3 Elections and Terms of Office

Section 1 — Each year the president, in consultation with the board, constitutes a nominating committee comprising of two past presidents who have not been members of the immediate two past nominating committees and president elect of the club, chaired by the senior most past president in order to nominate a president nominee for the year next to next, a president nominee designate to serve after the president nominee and other members of the board for incoming year. Members of nominating committee are not eligible to be candidates but are eligible to vote in case of ballot. If a written challenge is received by the board against any nomination within the time stipulated by the nominating committee, the position will be determined by a secret ballot at a RWM. In case of voting, club members must be informed at least one week in advance, Proxy voting is not allowed.

Section 2 — The candidate who receives a majority of the votes for each office is declared elected to that office.

Section 3 - A vacancy on the Board or any office shall be filled by the remaining members of the Board.

Section 4 — A vacancy of any officer-elect position or director-elect position shall be filled by the remaining members of the Board-elect.

Section 5 — Terms of office for each role will be one year.

Section 6 — The President nominee designated must have previously served as a member of the board for a full term.

Article 4 Duties of the Board and key positions of the club.

Section 1 — President. The president shall preside at club and Board meetings.

Section 2 — Immediate Past President. The immediate past president shall serve as a director.

Section 3 — President-elect. The president-elect shall prepare for his/her year in office and serve as a director.

Section 4 — President Nominee. The president Nominee shall prepare for his/her year in office and serve as a director.

Section 5 — Vice President. The vice president shall preside at club and Board meetings in the absence of the president.

Section 6 — Director. A director shall attend club and Board meetings.

Section7— Secretary. The secretary is responsible to keep details of club members, records of club meetings with attendance record of participants and other club documents as well as copies of correspondence. In coordination with the president, treasurer, he/she is to complete renewal processes of the club as required by the prevailing Nepalese law within the month of Shrawan (Mid August).

Section 8 — Treasurer. The treasurer shall oversee and take custody of all club funds and keep necessary accounting records of daily transactions thereof. In

coordination with the immediate past treasurer, he/ she is also responsible to conclude statutory audit of the books of accounts by a certified auditor appointed by the Club, to file online tax return and to get tax clearance certificate from the concerned tax office within the month of Shrawan (Mid August).

Section 9 — Every board member is to perform any additional duties as assigned by the board.

Section 10 – Sergent-at-arms takes care and helps to maintain order in the club meetings.

Section 11 – The Trainer keeps himself update about the rotary international literature, culture, activities and events and always endeavors to educate all the members of the club as required to help members be pursuant to a ideal Rotarian.

Section 12 – The Editor is responsible to edit and publish club annual souvenir, maintains its quality and informative so as to build club image and make credible reading material for members and interested others.

Article 4 (a) Membership

Section 1 — Eligibility criteria for a member shall be

- a. As per the prevailing Nepal law on membership disqualification
- b. As per the New membership procedure approved by the Board
- c. Rotary membership principles set by Rotary international.
- Section 2 All the existing members shall be in compliance to this article.
- Section 3 The board may amend membership procedure as required.
- Section 4 The membership of the club is supposed to be terminated on the:
- a. Death of the incumbent member.
- b. Resignation by the members approved by the Board.
- c. Any condition prevailed under section 1 above.
- d. Termination decision made by the Board against failure to pay club annual dues under article 6 and violation of duties and responsibilities set by the club by- laws.

Section 5 — Terminating member is liable to pay any dues outstanding before the date of termination.

Article 5 Meetings

Section 1 — Annual Meeting. An annual meeting of this club shall be held no later than 31 December to elect the officers and directors who will serve for the next Rotary year.

Section 2 — The regular weekly meetings of the Club are held on Friday at 6.00 pm. Reasonable notice of

continuation or any postponement or cancellation of the meeting shall be duly circulated to all the members and concerned.

Section 3 — The regular weekly meeting(s) may be held online in unusual circumstances.

Section 4 — The Club may hold 1 (one) of its regular weekly meetings per month on virtual platform.

Section 5 — Board meetings are held each month on the day and time fixed by the board. Special meetings of the Board are called with reasonable notice by the president or upon the request of at-least two directors.

Section 6 — Annual General meeting will be held at the time of 1st Club assembly where the club's audited financial statements and progress report of the previous year, appointment of auditor for coming year and other agenda will be resolved.

Article 6 Fees and Dues

Section 1 — For a new member, an admission fee of Rs 5,000 (Five Thousand) shall be paid when the application for membership is approved by the board for the qualifying member.

Section 2 — Membership dues includes RI per capita dues, annual subscription of the Rotarian and Rotary regional magazine, rotary district per capita dues, club annual dues, and any other Rotary or District per capita due assessed by RI, district or the club. The Membership dues shall be in the amount of Rs 28,000 (Twenty-Eight Thousand) per capita per year payable on semi-annual basis. Any dues other than RI and District dues are not be mandatory, provided the decision of the board otherwise. Based on the general price level circumstances, fees and dues shall be reviewed by the board as it is considered.

Section 3 – Where both husband and wife are member of this club, the annual per capita dues as per section 2, shall be Rs. Rs 25,000 (Twenty-Five Thousand) only each.

Section 4 - For any incoming member, who is also the member of Rotaract Club of Yala, per capita annual membership dues under section 1 shall be Rs. 20,000 (Twenty Thousand) applicable for two succeeding rotary years.

Section 5 - Each member should pay the semiannual due by the 15th day of each semiannual period (i.e. July 15 and January 15). None compliance of this section shall attract membership termination clauses subject to the Board Decision otherwise.

Section 6 - Membership dues for a new member shall be equal to one-twelfth of the annual per capita dues for each full month of membership.



Article 7 – Method of Voting

The business of this club is conducted by voice vote or show of hands except for the election of officers and directors, which is conducted by ballot. The Board may provide a ballot for a vote on a specific resolution.

Article 8 – Committees

Section 1 — In order to coordinate the efforts of the club in achieving the club's annual and long-range goals, the club will have the following standing committees:

- Club Administration
- Membership
- Public Relations
- Rotary Foundation
- Service Projects

Section 2 — Additional committees may be appointed as needed. Any add hoc committee may be formed by the board as it is necessary to be formed.

Section 3 — The president and secretary shall be an ex officio a member of all committees and as such have all privileges of participation in the meetings.

Section 4 — Except where special authority is given by the Board, committees shall not take action until a report has been made and approved by the Board. The president or the Board shall refer additional business to a specific committee as needed.

Section 5 — Each committee chair shall be responsible for regular meetings and activities of the committee, shall supervise and coordinate the work of the committee, and shall report to the Board on all committee activities.

Article 9 – Finances

Section 1 — Prior to each fiscal year, the Board shall prepare an annual budget of estimated income and expenditures.

Section 2 — The treasurer shall deposit club funds in financial institution(s) designated by the Board, divided into two parts: club operations and service projects.

Section 3 — Bills are paid by the treasurer or another authorized officer when approved by president of the club.

Section 4 - A thorough annual review (annual audit) of all financial transactions shall be completed by a qualified auditor.

Section 5 — An annual financial statement of the club shall be provided to club members.

Section 6 — The fiscal year is from 1 July to 30 June. Section 7 –Bank accounts of the club will be operated by joint signature of President and Treasurer.

Article 10 – Method of Electing Members



Article 10 A – Active Members

Section 1 - A member shall provide a candidate's name to the Board. A transferring or former member of another club may also be proposed for membership by the former club. The proposal is kept confidential unless the Board instructs otherwise.

Section 2 — The Board shall ensure that the candidate meets all of Rotary's membership requirements.

Section 3 — The Board shall approve or reject the candidate's membership within 30 days and shall notify the proposer of its decision.

Section 4 — If the decision of the Board is favorable, the prospective member is invited to join the club, educated about Rotary and membership requirements, and asked to sign the membership proposal form and to allow his or her name and proposed classification to be conveyed to the club.

Section 5 — If no member of the club submits a written objection including reasons for the objection, to the Board within seven days after the club is notified of the prospective member, that person, upon payment of the admission fee, is considered to be elected to membership. If an objection has been filed with the Board, the club shall vote on this matter at its next meeting. If approved despite the objection, the proposed member is elected to membership after admission fee payment.

Article 10 B - Honorary Members

The club may grant honorary membership to distinguished personalities proposed by the Board.

Article 10 C – Corporate Members

The club may offer corporate members as mentioned in "Corporate Membership Bylaws" adopted by the Club.

Article 11 - Resolutions

Any resolutions or motions to commit the club to any position or action shall first be reviewed and approved by the Board. If resolutions or motions are first offered at a club meeting, they shall be sent to the Board without discussion. The modus operandi for proposing and approving the resolution will be similar to amendment of these bylaws.

Article 12 – Amendments

These Bylaws may be amended at any regular club meeting. Changing the club bylaws requires that written notice be sent to each member 10 days before the meeting, that a quorum be present for the vote,

and that two-thirds of the votes support the change. Changes to these bylaws must be consistent with the Standard Rotary Club Constitution, the RI Constitution and Bylaws, and the Rotary Code of Policies.

Corporate Membership Bylaws (as adopted by club meeting on February 19, 2021)

Article 1 – Corporate Member – The club shall offer a corporate membership program for a corporation – or any business, nonprofit, government entity, professional practices, or educational institutions, an alternative membership package to some of its employees recognizing the growing importance that business place on corporate social responsibility.

- 1. Qualification: The employees of any business are eligible for Corporate Membership in the Rotary Club of Yala.
- 2. Members: Subject to the approval of the club's board, the business designates employees to serve as members of the Club and may appoint up to 3 people to be primary members and alternatives.
- 3. Attendance: Attendance and participation requirements of the Club may be met by any of the members.
- 4. Dues: As per Model 1
- 5. RI registration: Primary Corporate member for whom RI dues have been paid are registered as active members in Rotary's database.

- 6. Votes and Quorum For the purpose of general meetings and club matters, the primary corporate member is eligible to vote having only one vote.
- 7. Holding office: Any RI dues-paying member listed in Rotary's database, which includes the primary Corporate member, is eligible to hold office. Alternatives who do not pay RI dues are not eligible.

Dues Structure for Corporate members

Model 1: In which only the primary member is assessed dues and reported to Rotary International as an active member.

Primary Member - 1

Alternative member - 2

Membership dues – Rs 50,000 and Admission fee – Rs 10,000

Model 2: In which the Club assesses a flat rate for a certain number of corporate members.


For Two Corporate Member – Rs 90,000 and Admission Fee Rs 10,000 (Average cost, per member Rs 50,000)

For Three Corporate Member – Rs 110,000 and Admission Fee Rs 10,000 (Average cost per member Rs 40,000)





